


Where does the ukulele originate?



The ukulele originated in the 19th century as a Hawaiian adaptation of the Portuguese machete, a small guitar-like instrument, which was introduced to Hawaii by Portuguese immigrants, many from Madeira and the Azores. 
Strumming your ukulele.




Thumb method




Index finger method




To play a C chord, press your third finger, left hand, next to the third fret, first string — the place marked by a red dot (if you are using a sticker system.)













London's burning, London's burning! Fetch the engines! Fetch the engines! Fire, fire! Fire, fire! Pour on water, Pour on water.




Try singing this song as a round while you strum the accompaniment.


To play the F chord, use your first and second fingers - your "peace sign" fingers.
Press the strings firmly as shown in the diagram below. Place your thumb on the back of the ukulele neck.
















